Thank You for your 2024-25 OIF Financial Support

Our (OIF) Optimist International Foundation had a very successful year with a 32% increase in total OIF contributions. Our DMM members contributed the second highest ever total OIF donations in the amount of \$33, 783.03 ranking FOURTH in all the OI Districts. The DMM had a 65.3% increase in the number of members who donated to Dime-a-Day (or \$36.50 per year)! We also had an increase in President's Club members Women's Philanthropic member Society donations.

Thank you for your incredible support of our OIF! It was a great honor to represent our DMM District as your OIF representative for 2024-25.

Putting Fun in Fundraising

Why Fun? Why Games?

Fundraising game benefits include: Everyone, Boost Excitement, Increased Engagement, Higher Revenue, More Social Interactions, Memorable Experience and Building Friendships/Engaging New Members. Fundraising events thrive when supporters are engaged, entertained and inspired to give.

Being Mindful: Play with Fairness and Rules – be sure to familiarize yourself with the rules that govern fundraising games. Check your state (province's) raffe licensing laws before running your event.

Games your club can play...

Heads & Tails – a simple and fast game where participants guess whether a coin flip will land on heads or tails. Before the flip, simply ask your participants to place their hand on their head or their tail. (buttox)

Silent Auction – Ask Members to donate baskets with items that they feel people will enjoy bidding on. Highest bid wins (pay at the end)

Raffle Basket – Sell tickets for a set amount throughout the event. The participant keeps one-half of the ticket, the other half can be put into any container. Pull the winning number from each container.

Wall of Wine – Have 12 different bottles of wine – sell chances. Put slips into a container. Draw one slip out – winner gets the wine. Or, charge a \$1.00 for three rings to try and get the ring on the bottle of wine.

52-Card Pick – Sell chances to win a prize by purchasing a playing card. The prize is awarded to the holder of the winning card drawn. Display a deck of cards. Sell each card. (Write name on a piece of paper next to the card identified). Once all cards are sold. They are shuffled by several people. A card will be drawn to determine the winner. Example: 52 cards @5.00 = \$260. Winner gets \$50 – Club gains \$210.

Guess the Weight of the Cake – Bake or buy a cake – make a secret note of its weight. Sell tickets for participants to guess the weight. Have participants write their name on one half of the ticket. Participants keep the other half of the ticket. The winner of the game will win the cake. Example: Tickets are \$5.00 each x 50 people = \$250.00 for the club.

More games will be shared next time!

Completing the Club Project Impact Report Online

Please Note: ALL Club Project Impact Reports must be completed online!

- 1. On the Optimist International website (https://www.optimist.org), click Optimist Leaders Login (in the top left corner).
- 2. Enter your email and password. click Login.
- 3. Once you are logged in, scroll down the page until you see the box to enter your Club Number. Enter your 5-digit Club Number and **click Submit.**
- 4. Once on your Club's page, scroll down under the membership roster and click Club Project Impact Report. Once on the Club Project Impact page, scroll down and click Start New Project Report.
- 5. Select the Project Type and **click Next.** Note: Optimist International Signature Program Project includes: Junior Optimist, Junior Golf, Essay, Oratorical, Communication Contest for the Deaf and Hard of Hearing (CCDHH), Optimist Day, and OWLS (projects in schools). All other projects would be considered a Community Project.
- 6. Select the Program Type and **click Next.** Note: The **Signature Program** list will fully appear on the screen and selection is made by clicking the corresponding dot. The **Community Project** selection is a dropdown list.
- 7. Select the group(s) of people served and **click Next.** Then select the approximate number of youth served from the dropdown list and **click Next.** Enter the number of volunteers and **click Next.**
- 8. Enter the number of volunteer hours per person and **click Next.** Then, select the approximate cost of the project from the dropdown list and **click Next.** Select if you collaborated with another organization and **click Next.**
- 9. Enter any additional information about the program and click Next. Review and confirm the information that has been entered and click Submit Report.
